When it comes to resilience, we at Tree Canada need not look far for inspiration.

Forests have provided a template for resilience for time immemorial, absorbing disturbances and shifting their function and structure to confront—with strength and tenacity—our evolving planet. This year, our organization adapted, innovated, developed stamina, and sparked hope. Like trees, we held stable and grew, even as the world faced the ongoing effects of the pandemic.

This year looked different than any one in our past. For an organization whose activities involve gathering to plant, our team displayed exceptional creativity and problem solving in light of the situation. This Impact Report showcases but a few examples of this. Building on our strong relationships with municipalities, corporations, and land stewards, we exceeded our anticipated tree planting goal for the year—and planted 60% more trees than in 2019!

These ongoing connections are also what enabled us to expand our reach and influence as an organization. We launched our Treemendous Communities program, increased our online engagement, and were invited to contribute to several high-profile forums, including an urban forestry think tank with Natural Resources Canada. We are also grateful and humbled by the support of an anonymous individual donor who pledged \$5 million to Tree Canada over the next five years. In reflecting on their donation, this individual referenced the ability of trees to mitigate climate change and recognized how our team has the expertise and relationships to ensure trees are not only planted, but that they mature and thrive to reach that potential. Thank you for trusting us to do this important work.

As an organization, we champion tree planting as a solution to the climate and biodiversity crisis, but also because of the broader community benefits that come alongside. In 2020, this was personal. The pandemic brought into sharp focus how much we need our community greenspaces and urban forests, as well as equitable access to them for our mental and physical well-being. Whether basking beneath the canopy as we picnicked, decompressed, or took yet another Zoom call, it was fantastic to see people enjoying and appreciating their nearby nature.

Thank you for being with us at every step of the way, especially during this challenging time. It won't be long before we can again come together; until then, let us seek solace in our forests and the connectedness they bring.

Ir lives were shattered by the Gustafsen fire in 2017. It devastated our property near 100 Mile House, BC, our neighbourhood, and thousands of acres of adjacent Crown land. My partner valiantly managed to save our house but lost his life's work and retirement plan when his studio workshop burnt to the ground.

The fire itself was an unnaturally intense burn that destroyed the soil as well as the trees. In spite of ongoing and expensive rehabilitation efforts on our land, three and a half years later there is no natural regeneration other than weeds and finally this year some poplar saplings. Our property and the surrounding land have been flooding since the fire, though we are not near any large body of water or creeks. With the forest gone, there is nothing to soak up the groundwater or prevent erosion.

Though we will not be around to experience a mature forest here again, watching the fir and pine seedlings that Tree Canada planted grow gives me a renewed sense of peace, hope, and appreciation for where we live. more than apparent during 2020. Bound to our neighbourhoods and homes, it was not rare to see someone staring attentively into a tree, watching for the red flash of a male cardinal or the scurrying of a squirrel. During this challenging year, trees helped us connect to ourselves and to our loved ones. Our community greening programs acknowledges the integral social, psychological, and economic benefits of our urban forests. By pairing sponsorship with grantees, we're helping more Canadians appreciate and restore them, too.

In 2020, we adapted our **Partners in Planting** program to accommodate the work-from-home reality of many teams. With a little creativity and problem solving, we worked with employers across nine provinces to plant more than 5,300 trees as part of this employee engagement and community building effort.

Tree Canada also continued to support the City of Winnipeg's **One Million Tree Challenge** through the financial support of CN, Telpay, and individual donors.

COMMUNITY TREE GRANTS

Treemendous Communities: We know that green communities are resilient communities. That's why last year we launched a new Community Tree Grant, Treemendous Communities, to expand the reach of our planting programs further still. This exciting new program will provide funding to municipalities, Indigenous communities, business improvement associations, non-profit, and community groups to plant trees. With more groups eligible for funding than ever before, Tree Canada is ensuring people across the country have equitable access to greenspace and the many long-lasting benefits it brings.

Edible Trees: COVID-19 exacerbated the challenge of food insecurity in many communities. Fruit and nut-bearing trees can help close the gap and are an act of resistance and care in the journey toward food sovereignty. An additional 2,163 edible trees went into the ground this year in 20 communities across the country. In the future, people will be able to enjoy delicious bounties of apples, cherries, hazelnuts, gooseberries, elderberries, and more, all thanks to the planting activities in 2020!

Greening Canada's School Grounds: From screen to green! Time spent outdoors took on added importance for students this past year, and nature was a place to safely gather and learn. When some students return to their school yard next fall (many after a long time away), the environment welcoming them back will be greener thanks to the over 400 trees planted last year in 15 communities, including in Saanichton, BC, Redwater, AB, and Pickering, ON.

OFFSETTING

PLANTING NEW HOPE

The pandemic helped catalyze action around the importance of trees for the environment and our well-being. When in-person planting events had to be cancelled, our team adapted on-the-fly and many sponsors channelled their support to our National **Greening Program**. As an outcome, we planted over 520,000 trees in 15 projects across Canada—a 62% increase from 2019!

Canada's 2 Billion Trees Initiative: Tree Canada submitted two significant proposals to the federal government as part of their bold mission to plant 2 billion trees ahead of 2030. We were thrilled to have both proposals accepted early in the 2021 fiscal year, with funds supporting both the planting of seedlings in rural environments and larger trees in urban settings in the coming year.

Save Paper, Plant Trees: More corporations partnered with Tree Canada to actively decrease their paper usage and reduce their environmental footprint. Last year, RBC Wealth Management committed to planting one tree for every household that chooses paperless billing. In 2020, they had 24,870 households go paperless! Launching their Trees for Paper program in 2018, TELUS has long been a leader in this field, and planted a further 34,000 trees last year.

Free-to-Grow: Tree Canada doesn't only plant trees—we closely monitor them for years to ensure they reach maturity. That includes on Chingee Family Traditional Territory bordering Augustine Lake in the British Columbia interior. In 2015, Tree Canada and CN reforested 58.7 hectares of land after it was devastated by mountain pine beetle. Last year marked the fifthyear survival assessment of the site, which is now punctuated by new-growth spruce, lodgepole pine, and interior Douglas fir. The trees were classified as free-to-grow, meaning they have reached a height where they can continue to grow unimpeded by other vegetation into the future.

An ecosystem-wide approach: What do salmon and trees have in common? A lot, actually! Our ecosystems are dynamic and interconnected, and tree and shrub planting can go a long way in restoring local river systems. That's the goal of a new working relationship between Tree Canada and the Central Westcoast Forest Society on Vancouver Island. The Society has a multi-year program to restore fish habitat in the Tranquil Watershed, and Tree Canada supported that mission through the planting of 30,000 native trees and shrubs.

OPERATION RELEAF

Regreening and replanting support don't stop, even amidst a global pandemic. Tree Canada continued its long-term commitment through several Operation ReLeaf projects, all the while being agile and flexible with municipalities and community groups that faced staffing cuts or needed to reschedule planting events based on shifting public health guidelines.

Operation ReLeaf Nova Scotia: Though natural disasters often happen over the course of days, their impacts are felt for years after. Such is the case across Nova Scotia, where thousands of trees were downed when Hurricane Dorian made landfall in September 2019. With the sponsorship of Home Hardware, we launched our newest Operation ReLeaf program, and will provide funding to Cape Breton, Liverpool, the Municipality of County of Inverness, Annapolis Royal, Bridgewater, and Halifax to replant more than 400 trees.

Operation ReLeaf BC Fires. We are proud to have distributed the remaining funding available to private landowners who were affected by the 2017 and 2018 wildfires. Last year, we supported 15 landowners in planting an additional 30,000 seedlings on private lands that would not otherwise have been eligible for replanting funding. Support from CN, Staples Business Advantage, and U-Haul made this work possible, as well as cooperation with the Government of British Columbia.

Operation ReLeaf Fort McMurray. Our work continued for a fourth year in neighbouring Alberta, where Fort McMurray residents faced ongoing challenges that included a spring flood, the pandemic, and an oil price crash. With the generous support of many organizations, including CN, Tree Canada partnered with the municipality of Fort McMurray to plant more than 11,000 FireSmart trees, and residents planted over 2,000 more.
