It is with immense pride and gratitude that we share our collective achievements from another successful year.

## Planting Trees, Growing Forests

One of Tree Canada's central goals is to increase canopy cover in cities and towns and grow forests across Canada to help mitigate climate change and its impacts. We achieve this through a diverse portfolio of tree planting programs.

Together with our partners, we plant trees on school grounds, in neighbourhood parks, on Indigenous lands and in areas affected by wildfires, windstorms or insect outbreaks. Every planting project is tailored to meet local ecosystem and community needs to multiply the benefits of each tree and shrub as they grow over time.

# National Greening Program



“We plant the most trees through our National Greening Program, which targets areas in need of reforestation, afforestation or ecosystem restoration. Our team provides landowners with expert advice, project management and funding to meet their planting goals.

## Project Spotlight

# Woodstock, ON

In 2023, Dairy Farmers of Canada sponsored a project that will support the planting of 450 eastern white cedar seedlings on the Vanderspek dairy farm. With the help of local partner Upper Thames River Conservation Authority, the project aims to plant a row of cedars along the edge of the farm field to help mitigate the effects of wind erosion and improve soil health.

“These projects with dairy farms within the Upper Thames River are expected to benefit the local watersheds’ water quality through reduced soil erosion. Local wildlife will benefit from the addition of linkages between existing natural features, and the creation of habitat.”

“Every year, we offer grants of up to \$10,000 to schools, community groups, Indigenous communities and municipalities who want to plan trees and shrubs.

With each grant type – Greening Canada’s School Grounds, Edible Trees and Tremendous Communities – Tree Canada experts provide technical support to help start, upgrade, or achieve planting projects, and to develop and implement proven urban forest management practices.

## Project Spotlight

# Eel Ground, NB

In October 2023, 35 edible trees and shrubs were planted to bolster Natoaganeg School’s outdoor classroom thanks to support from Tree Canada and project sponsor FedEx. The Natoaganeg School sees the addition of a food forest as a natural extension of its curriculum. The school’s vision for this new outdoor space included fruit, nut, and medicinal trees and shrubs, such as sage, cedar, and blueberries. Incorporating these native plants into the schoolyard offers students an immersive learning experience that not only broadens their knowledge but also provides access to healthy food.

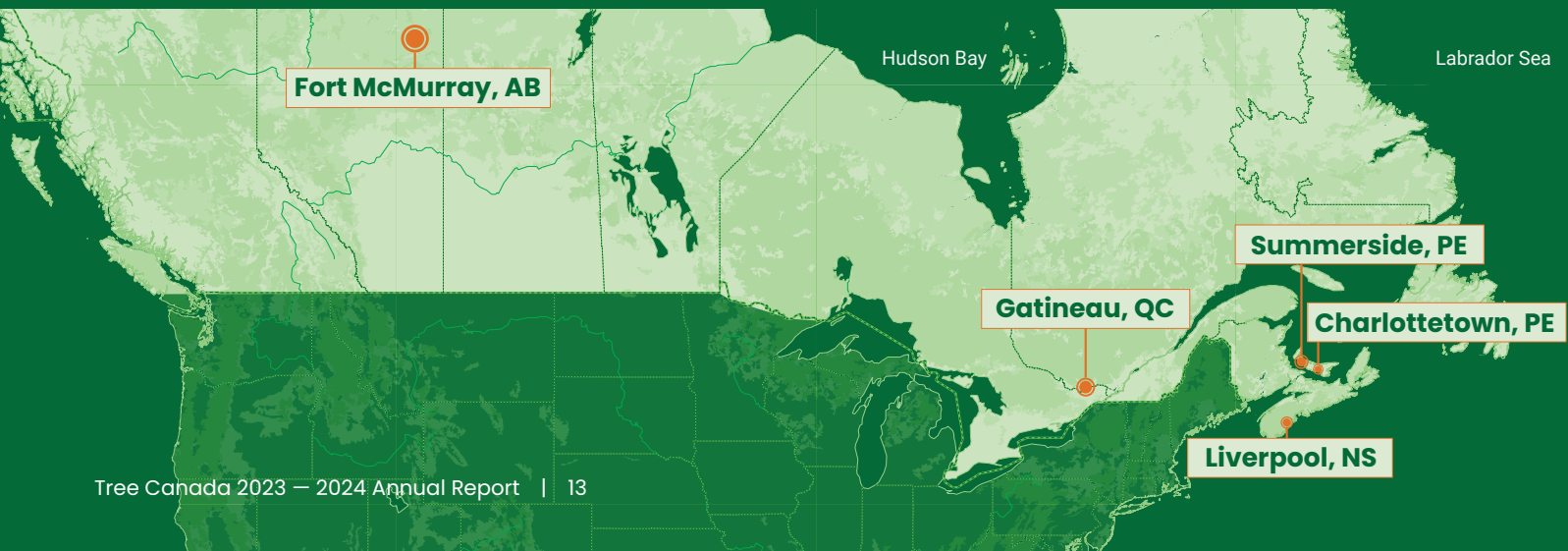

# Summerside, PE

## Slemon Park

In the wake of Hurricane Fiona, which wreaked havoc across Prince Edward Island in September 2022, 80% of Slemon Park's old-growth trees were felled, severely altering the landscape of this small community. "After Fiona it was sad," said Tracy Brown, Executive Director of Bedeque Bay Environmental Management Association (BBEMA).

"What used to be a really good community, that had really nice shade, basically became an open green space. We would [usually] have birds and [other wildlife] building their nests, and this spring there weren't any. And so, we really wanted to make sure that we put some trees back."

In October 2023, staff from BBEMA, Slemon Park Corporation and a local grade 7 class embarked on a mission to restore tree canopy in this area. Together they planted 560 trees of different sizes along a nature trail, 165 of which were funded by Tree Canada.

## Research Projects & Partnerships

Many of the research projects we collaborated on last year investigated the needs, barriers and existing infrastructure that influence the current state of the urban forestry sector in Canada. For example, Tree Canada participated in a two-day workshop on identifying barriers and opportunities to improve cross-sectoral collaboration with industry professionals, hosted by Concordia University and Environment and Climate Change Canada. Results of this workshop are under review for publication.

## Professional Engagement

### E-lecture series

For the 8th year in a row, Tree Canada, in collaboration with the Canadian Institute of Forestry hosted two E-Lecture series in 2023.

These free webinars are an excellent forum for our urban forestry community to share knowledge with students, academics and colleagues on topical subjects across the sector. Last year, the two series focused on “Finding and Training Urban Forest Staff in 2023” (Spring) and “Equity and Urban Forests in Canada” (Fall).

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In 2023, Tree Canada was contacted by two individuals who wished to make a significant donation in honour of a milestone birthday.

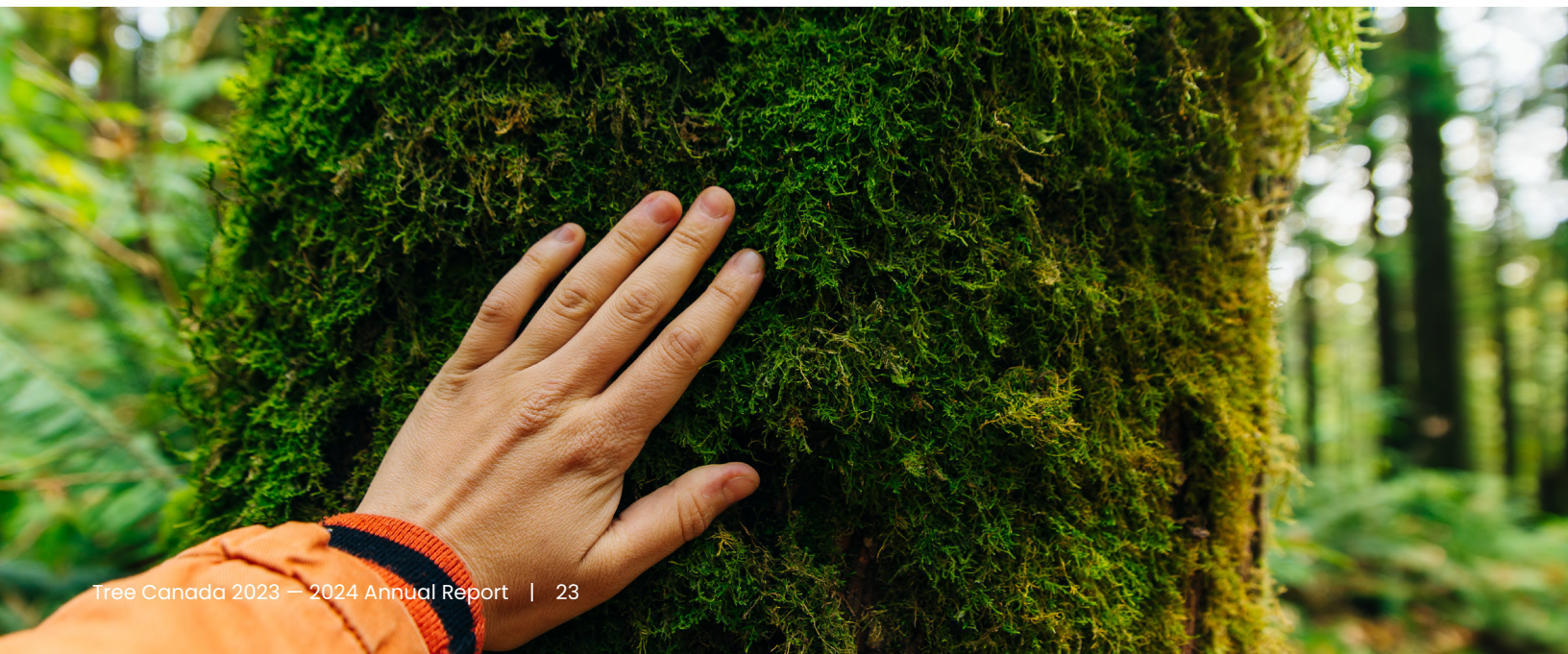

## Striving for Excellence

At Tree Canada, we know that to authentically establish meaningful partnerships and empower Canadians, we have to be the best version of ourselves. In 2023 we invested in strengthening our organization from the inside out.

Tree Canada continues to prioritize an equitable and inclusive culture, and with the help of key partners, increase our understanding of Indigenous knowledge, cultures, and traditional practices as it relates to sustainable management of the environment.

# Working with Indigenous Communities

## Workshop: Indigenous Understanding

In December 2023, Cambium Indigenous Professional Services hosted a two-day workshop for Tree Canada’s staff, partners, and sponsors. The workshop highlighted important considerations for increasing our understanding of Indigenous cultures and histories and how to build more meaningful relationships in the context of our work. The workshop helped foster further discussions and initiate opportunities to continue our shared learning.

## The T’excelcenc – Williams Lake First Nation Planting Project



The 2017 wildfires in British Columbia severely burned many regions across the province, including around Williams Lake. Since then, some forests in the region have struggled to regenerate naturally. To help restore the area, Williams Lake First Nation (WLFN) planned to plant a mix of lodgepole pine, Douglas-fir and ponderosa pine to stabilize terrain and ensure carbon sequestration.

In 2023, Tree Canada supported WLFN’s project, helping to plant 102,000 seedlings through the National Greening Program. Unfortunately, 2023 was a season of severe drought and survival assessments indicated 52% survival. Though it’s not uncommon for planting projects to require infill planting, especially in climates prone to drought, Tree Canada continues to work with WLFN to plan an infill planting to account for the loss of seedlings.

## Tłıchq Caribou Habitat Reforestation Program

Tree Canada has partnered with the Tłıchq Government and Let’s Plant Trees to heal lands devastated by wildfires and regenerate caribou habitat by planting one million trees in the Northwest Territories. Millions of hectares of land were devastated by wildfires, with 2023 being the worst season on record. While the evacuation of Yellowknife made national news, the four communities that make up the Tłıchq Nation were also deeply affected.

The Head of Tree Canada’s National Greening Program, Randall Van Wagner, was invited by Tłıchq Grand Chief Jackson Lafferty to visit the areas that will be replanted:

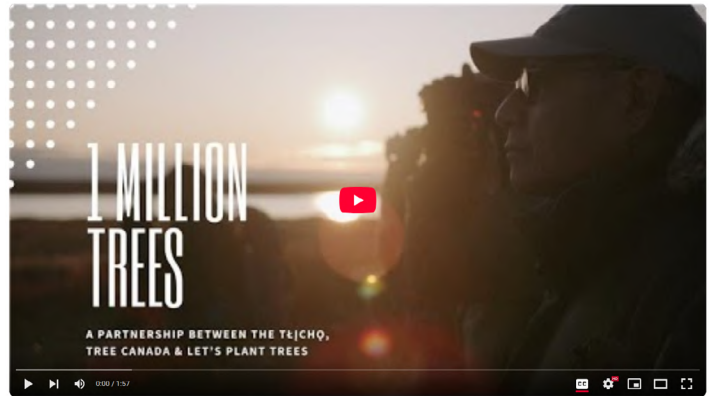
“During my visit, I was fortunate to meet with Elders from the community, who spoke about how wildfires have impacted their lands and people,” said Van Wagner. “Planting one million trees will help bring back the caribou over time, but it will also improve the lives of Tłıchq citizens who are engaged in all aspects of the project, from seed collection to planting and monitoring the trees.”

In October 2023, a group of Tłıchq citizens, including community Elders, were trained and engaged in coning and seed collection. They collected millions of black spruce cones and white birch seeds, which were shipped to a nursery in Saskatchewan. From here, they will be grown into viable seedlings before being shipped back to the Northwest Territories for initial planting in 2025.

This innovative partnership represents the most ambitious reforestation project ever undertaken in the Northwest Territories.
